



WORSHIP RESOURCES FOR THE 100th ANNIVERSARY OF REMEMBRANCE DAY

Sunday, November 11, 2018

These resources have been prepared by Lt(N) Rev. Michael Macintyre, ELCIC pastor, serving as Chaplain, 3rd Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, based in Edmonton, AB.

Notes on worship:

1. The proper name for the day is Remembrance Day, not Armistice Day or others. It is a Commonwealth day, originally to commemorate the close of the Great War at 11:00 a.m. on November 11, 1918; but since then in Canada it has expanded to include the Second World War, The Korean Conflict, lives lost in Peacekeeping and Support operations abroad, and recently the Afghanistan war.
2. Used in the context of congregational worship, timing may not be a practical consideration. Two minutes' silence is observed at 11:00 AM sharp in most places. That timing may or may not be feasible for congregations in worship.
3. Songs such as *O God, Our Help in Ages Past*, ELW #632, *Eternal Father, Strong to Save*, ELW #756, *God of Grace and God of Glory*, ELW #705, and other songs from the justice and peace section, ELW #s 706–729 would be appropriate for the day.

We are people of conflict, given to petty disputes and squabbling.
Like the apostles, we seek personal stature over community health.
Jesus comes to us, and models the way of service, self-sacrifice, and commitment to the common good of all.
May God strengthen us, empower us, and forgive us
In the name of Jesus Christ, your sins are forgiven and you are made new.
May you rejoice in this new day,
Remembering those who have given everything in the cause of peace and freedom,

Almighty and everlasting God, giver of wisdom, we pray for the leaders of every nation and tribe of this earth. May they see the human cost of their pride and hubris, and be humble of heart. Give them the strength to act righteously to protect the weak and the innocent, and the power to prevail over evil. Hear us, O God;

Your mercy is great.

Let us pray for soldiers. (*Silence*)

Almighty God, generations pass before you in an instant. Young men and women have laid down their lives for their friends, believing that in doing so they served both you, and their country. Look with mercy upon our foolhardy ways, and grant us peace. Be with those who keep the watch this day both at home and abroad, that they may know your love and mercy. Hear us, O God;
