Assembly 2023

The ELCIC and ACC met in convention for the second time under the theme *Let There be Greening*, at the University of Calgary from June 27–July 2, 2023.

The ACC General Synod met at the same time as the ELCIC's Special Convention, with several joint sessions involving both bodies for worship, fellowship, Bible study, presentations and other discussions—with other matters, such as voting and convention business, being conducted separately.

Assembly highlights include:

- ELCIC National Bishop Susan Johnson and Archbishop Linda Nicholls, Primate of the ACC, opened the Assembly 2023 plenary sessions with a state of the union address.
- The ELCIC Special Convention and ACC General Synod approved motions to bring the ACC, ELCIC and the Canadian churches of the Moravian Church in North America into full communion.
- Delegates approved an amended resolution calling on both churches to respond to
 opportunities for solidarity, advocacy and to pray for peace and justice in Palestine and Israel.
- On Canada Day, the assembly session began with an invitation to reflection from Anglican and Lutheran leaders, including National Indigenous Anglican Archbishop Chris Harper.
- Throughout the 2023 ELCIC Special Convention, delegates heard from four task forces, all of which were formed out of convention action at the 2019 ELCIC National Convention.
- The Task Force Addressing Ableism, Task Force Addressing Homophobia, Biphobia and Transphobia, Task Force Addressing Racism, White Supremacy and Racial Justice, and the Task Force on Carbon Neutrality each spoke, with delegates voting to approve their reports.
- Pat Lovell was presented with the 2023 ELCIC Leadership Award for her dedication, work and love given through acts of service within the ELCIC. She is the third recipient of the award. •

Giving back to the great outdoors

The 2022 and 2023 summer seasons marked the return to camp for many families, church groups and individuals across the ELCIC. Following two years of COVID-related restrictions for the 2020 and 2021 camping seasons, faith-based Lutheran camps bounced back strongly in 2022 and 2023 with gratitude to their many financial supporters.

"Donations have certainly been up since COVID, which has really sustained us considering all we went through during the pandemic," said Paul Kopjar, assistant director of Sylvan Lake, Alberta's Camp Kuriakos. "That congregational support really has made a difference. Specifically, we receive donations from individual congregations, of both Lutheran and Anglican denomination."

Camp Lutherlyn, located just west of Ottawa, Ont., took the time off to take on some serious renovations around camp. In order to do so, Lutherlyn relied on a number of grants while running fundraisers, including a "100 X \$100" to which 100 separate donors provided \$100 to the camp. Synod-owned, Camp Lutherlyn leases its property from the Eastern Synod.

Over in the Manitoba/Northwestern Ontario Synod, Luther Village made some significant changes during COVID.

"When we took over, the summer shop was literally falling into the lake, our beloved dining hall building was falling apart and many cabins needed to be levelled, while others needed new roofs. And during COVID, you're losing so much of your income from not running kids' camps and school groups, so you're just trying to maintain," said co-executive director Lisa van Dijk.

"We just want to ensure we are best using the money we can raise. We thoroughly appreciate our remittance funding from the MNO Synod on a monthly basis."•

CLAY 2023: Ashes & Embers

or the first time since 2018, Lutheran and Anglican youth came together in-person for the Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth (CLAY) Gathering 2023: *Ashes & Embers*. A joint gathering between the ELCIC and ACC, youth of the two churches gathered from August 10–13. Typically held biennially, the 2020 event *En Route* was hosted online in 2021 due to the COVID pandemic.

For most in attendance, it was either their first CLAY event or their first in-person CLAY event. Between the large group gatherings, praise and worship sessions, reflective group experiences and personal prayer time, the trip out to Waterloo, Ont. was filled with experiences that will surely last a lifetime.

British Columbia Home Team Leader Darya Saèd submitted team reflections to *Canada Lutheran*—the official magazine of the ELCIC—from some of her youth following CLAY. Those responses are provided below:

The importance of strong partnerships

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada values the life-giving relationships of its many partners within Canada and around the world.

The ecumenical work and interfaith witness of the ELCIC is felt in every corner of the globe. With roughly 95,000 members, the ELCIC is sometimes seen as a small church among the world's Christian churches. However, ELCIC National Bishop Susan Johnson sees it differently.

"Despite limited resources and being a medium-size church, we know our church is far more effective when we work with partners," Bishop Johnson shared in a column for Canada Lutheran. "Together we can accomplish much more, strengthen relationships and work towards becoming a healthier church."

Through partnerships with the World Council of Churches (WCC), the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) and the Canadian Council of Churches (CCC), the ELCIC remains actively involved in the mission and ministry of all three organizations, continuing its growth and outreach with churches of other denominations and faith backgrounds.

The ELCIC also maintains its strong relationship with Canadian advocacy and humanitarian organization KAIROS and Canadian Lutheran World Relief (CLWR), while working closely with Global Mission and Companion Synod partners.

"We are a valued partner because we participate fully," Bishop Johnson said. We are valued because we take our turn in providing leadership. We are valued as we work to maintain our financial support. We are valued as we are seen being mediators. These partners are here for us as well, praying for us, supporting us, walking with us." •

Help us to see beyond the details and numbers, recognizing the greater purpose and impact of our collective efforts.

May we seek to be generous, compassionate, loving people of God. Keep us mindful of the many other needs in the world — conflicts, refugees, poverty, and all other concerns that we name before you now.

All this we pray in your name. Amen.
